Junior Science Rock Club News

Our next meeting will be held Tuesday, January 9th, 5:00 - 6:30 pm at the clubhouse. (Note the start time change to 5:00 pm!) Activities will center around methods of rock and mineral identification.

At our December meeting, 13 members transformed river rocks into imaginative desert cacti using pots, paints, foam, glue, and artificial flowers. The results were as varied as our members. Projects were topped off with desert sand for that final touch of authenticity and stability.

Opportunities for GJGMC members to contribute:

The focus in 2024 is on increasing our ability to accurately identify specimens. Developing an eye for what to look for when out hounding on a hillside comes from looking at a lot of rock. Please consider your collections and how we might benefit from seeing what you felt moved to bring home.

JSRC utilizes the AFMS curriculum and badge program as its foundation. There is no fee for participation. Parents or adults interested in enrolling children or grandchildren into the program please find enrollment forms and information on the GJGMC website.

JSRC Summary Report 2023

JSRC held a total of 11 regular meetings during 2023. 7 units from the AFMS curriculum were utilized for meeting programming. Seven field trips were offered including a tour of CMU Geology Department, GJGMC lab, and the Harmon "Fluorescent Minerals" closet.

We had participation by 5 adult club members and one community member as presenters in addition to co-leaders Pam Bersch and Bev O'Neil. Mary Kay Hughes, a retired science teacher, volunteered during meeting activities in addition to those parents/grandparents present. Bambi Harmon in addition to presenting helped out numerous times over the year.

Over 150 badges were handed out representing the past two years of participation by our membership. Seven members reached their Rock Hounder status and are listed on the AFMS Junior website.

Membership increased from 34 at the beginning of the year to 49 by year's end. Meeting attendance ranged from a low of 8 to a high of 22 members at regular meetings. The average attendance for the year was 14 members per monthly meeting with their parent/grandparent.

Multiple donations of rocks and fossils were made by several club members. These donations were passed on to JSRC members for inclusion in their personal rock collections.

This year we marked special opportunities for the membership including the following notable items.

- $\circ~$ Seven members reached their Rock Hounder status and are now listed on the AFMS Junior website.
- We received a special invitation from Cassandra Fenton and the CMU Geology Department to tour their classrooms and lab.
- Jim Barkley submitted a fossil sample on behalf of JSRC which was accepted into the University of Florida carbon fossil collection at the Florida Museum of Natural History.
- 4 students created displays for the annual rock show in September. Professor Fenton from CMU's geology department evaluated their exhibits.
- JSRC contributed 46 volunteer hours to the annual rock show. 13 members and 10 parents worked two-hour shifts to cover activities at Kids Korner including grab bags and the kid's bingo game.
- Our first 14-year-old member began the "Introduction to Lapidary" class to qualify to work in an open shop.

Challenges for 2024

Providing programming that is active and engaging in addition to informational. Increasing the number of field trips offered to JSRC. Creating a structure for meetings that require more involvement by the membership itself rather than the adults exclusively running the "show". Increasing the number of members entering displays at the annual rock show. Making connections with Mesa County Fair to open up member participation with displays.



Coal Mines and Fossils in Mesa County

Almost as soon as Grand Junction was a town, coal mining started nearby. Remnants of old mines can be found where trails cross coal beds, and several places where little bits of smoke still come out of mines. The coal mines are mostly in layers in the more than 65-million-year-old Mancos Formation and the more sandstone layers above the Mesa Verde Formation. These are the grayish slopes and sandstone ledges on top that make up the Book Cliffs north of town as well as slopes east of Palisade.

Mines operated starting in the late 1880s and included gravity-powered tramways to haul the coal down, mine workers, and even a "town" of Carpenter atop the Book Cliffs. At first, the mines were surface mines, but then tunneling had to be used. A few years before the Depression, several things happened to result in the closing of the mines. First, a fire started that couldn't be extinguished. Then the United States started switching to oil and natural gas.

Sadly, three area teenagers suffocated to death in 1989 while exploring one of the old mines, and the area was subsequently closed. It's never safe to go into a coal mine, and risky to go into any mine, due to everything from carbon monoxide to radon to mine collapse.

Since layers of coal were formed at the bottom of a deep sea, along with swamps and deltas alongside it, there are lots of fossils to be found. People find fossils of baculites, clams, ammonites, vegetation imprints, sharks, fossil tracks made by various animals, fish, and reptiles. Several drainages come off of the Book Cliffs, where fossils can often be found. The Grand Junction Gem and Mineral Club have done field trips to the area in the past.

The best times to look for these fossils is anytime the roads are NOT wet, and NOT in the heat of summer! Mancos soils are extremely slippery when wet! Otherwise, it's a close-by and fun place to hunt!
