Diamond Mine in Colorado???

Everyone has probably heard about the place in Arkansas where you can pay to hunt for diamonds. But Colorado also has a diamond deposit! It was even commercially mined from 1996 to 2001. Supposedly the nation's biggest diamond deposit, the Kelsey Lake diamond mine produced mostly small, irregular diamonds. However, two of the larger ones are on display at the Smithsonian! But the big question is, why on earth are diamonds in this one spot in Colorado with no others around (as far as we know!)

In the 1960s, CSU geologists were studying some weird rocks north of Ft. Collins – weird because rodents liked to tunnel through them and they contained unusual minerals... minerals found only where there had been really high temperatures and pressures – like deep underground. Students studied them by doing the familiar process of putting some polishing grit on a plate and grinding them flat to look at under a microscope. Something very weird happened, instead of the grit grinding down the rocks, the rocks ground grooves in the plate. In other words, the rocks contained minerals harder than coarse grit. They were diamonds!

When geologists mapped where these rocks were, they found they were in volcanic pipes called Kimberlite pipes (from the place in South Africa where they were first found). The rocks form deep underground and then are brought close to the surface by deep volcanoes.

One of the coolest things about these diamonds is being discovered by geologists at the Denver Museum of Nature and Science. They've opened up a whole new understanding of how our mountain ranges and continents formed over time. They have even let us figure out that Earth's water didn't come from comets but from rocks. Scientists figured that out by analyzing tiny amounts of minerals included in the diamonds. Their studies have also helped predict where other diamond deposits might be.

Some of the deposits are on private land, but there are some spots on public land that you can hike to. One is the Chicken Park group of pipes in the Roosevelt National Forest north of the Prairie Divide. Another accessible pipe is the Green Mountain kimberlite, on Boulder City Parkland east of Green Mountain, south of Flagstaff Mountain. The deposits tend to be in areas of the forests with fewer trees, because of the minerals in the rocks. Don't expect to find any big diamonds, but it's kind of fun to know the deposits are there!



Junior Science Rock Club News

JSRC Summary Report for 2024

Junior Science and Rock Club, JSRC, provides geological programming for children ages 5 to 18 through a curriculum developed by the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, AFMS. Grand Junction Gem and Mineral Club sponsors this program and provides meeting space, storage space, and financial support for the programming provided A team of volunteers works together to provide activities and presentations centering around geology and its related aspects. AFMS supports JSRC with badges of recognition for the various units and activities completed.

A total of 39 children ages 5 to 18 enrolled in JSRC activities during 2024. The club met a total of 9 times. The average attendance per meeting was 11 children with a high of 23 and a low of 2. (There was an unanticipated conflict with public school start-up programming for the scheduled August meeting.) During the year four AFMS curriculum units were presented with three topics added to reflect our area and local interests

This year featured a presentation made by a parent/child team. Additionally, there were four special speakers including a maps unit presented by CMU instructor Cassandra Fenton. There were 6 field trips offered throughout the year attended by JSRC families.

Kids Korner at GJGMC's Annual Rock Show was managed and supervised by JSRC parents and kid volunteers. Three activities were provided to the public, Spin the Wheel game, Start your own Rock Collection activity, and a Block Out Bingo game. This year's show theme was Rock 'N Roll with the bingo game featuring geodes from around the world. Completing a bingo card earned players a mini geode. Kids volunteering record their hours towards earning their volunteer pin from the local club.

Changes were made in 2024 to improve the programming provided for kids. After one of two coleaders retired, a request was put out to the club membership for new volunteers. During that interim, the July meeting was canceled due to a lack of adult coverage. We now have a team of 5 volunteers working together to provide support for JSRC.

There are several elements to JSRC: programming and special speakers, attendance and document management, badge program and record-keeping, correspondence, field trips, and hands-on activities planning. These elements are now spread out amongst the team and travel plans should no longer affect the JSRC schedule. In an attempt to continue to meet the needs of our families, we sought input into issues around scheduling and attendance. RSVP requests have been added to notices and announcements to better anticipate attendance and supply requirements. We have also begun posting meeting dates and programs in 3-month blocks to keep parents better informed.

GJGMC members provide expertise in geology and present programs at meetings including sharing their collections. They also support the club with donations of minerals, fossils, and rocks. Kids learn about each sample and then add it to their rock collections at home. Pertinent information is provided for inclusion on the specimen labels. Member donations also support the rock show "Start your own Rock Collection" activity. Thanks to everyone who has participated in and supported JSRC during the 2024 year. Without your continued participation JSRC could not go forward.
